DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT





Dear Friends.

Citing the serious toll of the pandemic, the American Academy of Pediatrics has declared children's mental health a national emergency. In response, Wildrock launched a *Playing Our Way to Recovery Initiative* to provide restorative nature experiences for children and families. In the face of pandemic losses and disruptions, Wildrock's mission to promote *nature play for health and happiness* is needed now more than ever.

Nature play is one of a handful of evidenced-based approaches that is both intrinsically motivating for children and powerfully beneficial for children's emotional well-being. Throughout the pandemic period, Wildrock innovated new school-based programs, camps, themed trail walks, virtual field trips and workshops to increase access to the healing benefits of nature play. We are grateful for the support of our volunteers, staff, donors, visitors and community partners for joining us in uplifting children through nature play.

PLAYSCAPE PROGRAMS

For pandemic safety, Wildrock opened "Quaranteam" Adventures on the Playscape, themed trail walks, and self-guided education trails to complement virtual learning. Visitor feedback repeatedly mentioned that Wildrock is a valued safe resource for joyful play and stress release during the pandemic.





Timed trail walks allowed families and friends to celebrate the seasons safely! Wildrock is the only park in our area offering this safety measure.







NEIGHBORHOOD OUTREACH

In response to pandemic restrictions, Wildrock innovated multiple virtual programs in response to public school need.

Leche, the education rabbit, made online visits with students



Wild About Animals: Wildrock brought our education animals to students through virtual field trips. Students learned about animal habitats and adaptations while visiting with Wildrock's rabbit, turtle, snake, and hedgehog.



A virtual habitat created by students. The project reduced COVID isolation for over 200 upper elementary students.

Habitat For Humans: Wildrock innovated a social emotional learning program for Charlottesville City School 5th graders. Students used a design thinking porcess to creat virtual habitats for humans and animals. Dr. Jessica Stern, a postdoctoral fellow at UVA, studied student outcomes and found the program reduced anxiety levels.

Thanks to a **Community Recovery and Catalyst Grant** from the Charlottesville Area Community Foundation, Wildrock worked with Charlottesville High Schools students and UVA students to survey city residents. The survey revealed how people perceive their access and engagement with green spaces. Results will shape future programs.

SUMMER PROGRAMS





When pandemic restrictions lifted in the spring, we seized the moment and planned an expansive summer day camp program in order to reach students in need. With support from the Hilltop Foundation and the Prana Fund-CACF we successfully:

- hired and trained 20 new teachers and counselors to facilitate camps both onsite and in area public schoolyards.
- launched therapeutic expressive art and nature play programs in four middle schools and six elementary schools.

Over 800 students attended Wildrock's day camp programs. Delivered in partnership with the UVA Equity Center and county and city public schools, the programs featured social emotional learning activities to support pandemic recovery.



EcoArt and Pop Up Play

Throughout the spring and fall, Wildrock worked weekly with the Boys and Girls Club on Cherry Avenue and in Southwood to provide playbased art explorations with repurposed materials. We also partnered with MACAA Headstart for pop up play-programming for four year olds. Both programs provided access to the vital benefits of play.

THE EVIDENCE





Children rely on play to make sense of their world and to develop coping strategies. When children are invited to take their play into nature, the documented benefits of free play are amplified. Decades of research shows that access to natural spaces works to counteract the the ill-effects of stress and trauma.

Research shows that the best way to promote children's recovery from the stress of the pandemic is through PLAY1

When kids play outdoors, research has found that children are better able to regulate their emotions and to build positive relationships with their peers. Kids that play in nature do better academically, as they are healthier, happier and more prepared to learn.

Wildrock works to make highquality nature play experiences more accessible to children by transforming urban green spaces into pop-up play zones.










Earlier this year, Wildrock completed its three year strategic plan. Our primary goal of promoting nature play equity has remained consistent since our founding. In FYI 2020-2021, we documented the following outcomes.

Goal: Serve as a trusted resource for joyful nature play 97.2% of visitors surveyed agree that Wildrock fills a needed niche in our community for promoting nature connection and free play.

100% of teachers agree Wildrock programs address critical needs for healthy child development.

Goal: Create therapeutic play experiences responsive to mental health needs

94.4% of visitors surveyed agree that being at Wildrock offers a valued opportunity to reduce stress and enjoy a restorative experience in nature.










NATURE PLAY CHALLENGE

Wildrock partnered with the UVA School of Architecture and Convoy Designs to research and design an innovative *Cville Nature Play Map*. Over thirty public green spaces were coded for the play motifs suited to their natural features. The map will be used by schools, doctors for park prescriptions, mental health agencies, and the general public.





Wildrock's First Annual *Nature Play Challenge*. Each day over a two-week period, families received a *Play Spark* email to inspire exploration of our area green spaces and invite new, creative forms of nature play. The program and the surrounding social media campaign raised awareness about the streams, forests, and meadow areas suited for children's play and



EQUITY INITIATIVES

Nature play has an **equigenic effect**, meaning that when given equal access to nature play opportunities, children in underresourced neighborhoods benefit more than children living near high-quality green space. By providing under-resourced communities with quality nature play experiences, Wildrock addresses multiple issues of inequity including physical health, social-emotional wellness, and school-readiness.



FINANCIAL OVERVIEW


